Dear Friends of Lyngblomsten,

2021 was a momentous year, and we are filled with expectant hope!

In the past year, Lyngblomsten continued dealing with COVID-19 and its related healthcare and staffing challenges. Through it all, staff have stayed the course innovatively and passionately carrying out our mission, while tenants, residents, and families adjusted to ongoing changes in protocols and programming. Vaccinations late in 2020 and early 2021 bolstered our hope for a resolution to the pandemic. Hope grew with the full return of visitors, the reengagement of volunteers, and a rebound of census in the care center. We see signs that the pandemic is loosening its grip following an uptick through the holidays and beginning of 2022. Our prayers continue for an end to this pandemic and for the consolation of those who have lost loved ones to this disease.

In addition to the ongoing modifications to our resident programs, Lyngblomsten's community programs found ways to thrive online. New-found skills with technology are leading us into new ways of providing services to people beyond our Como Park campus. The Care Ministry Network and eRespite are great examples of innovating the delivery of learning and service. With work begun in 2021 adopting and developing an online engagement platform, 2022 will bring even more online services to even more people.

After a long pause begun in 2020 to focus on the pandemic, the development of a second campus resumed. About half of the past year was spent on arranging the necessary permits, approvals, and financing for this important new project. The persistence of Lyngblomsten's administrative team and the hard work of many has resulted in groundbreaking, site clearing, and foundation pouring at the Lino Lakes campus on the northwest corner of Hodgson Road and County Road J. Reservations are being received for housing options on the new campus which will welcome its first tenants to the townhomes later this year and to the apartments in 2023.

Pandemic trials give way to hope

As 2020 wrapped up and 2021 began, glimmers of hope were appearing as the first COVID vaccines became available. By mid-March, the majority of Lyngblomsten's residents, tenants, and employees were fully vaccinated—making way for a gradual return of familiar activities, from full indoor visitation opportunities to on-campus volunteers and more. A year filled with trials gave way to one filled with renewed hope!

Shovels signify hopes realized

2021 saw the hopes and hard work of many come to fruition as Lyngblomsten broke ground for a new senior living campus in Lino Lakes—a project that had been put on hold when the pandemic hit. By the time the Lyngblomsten Board of Directors gave final approval for the project in late September, nearly a decade's worth of visioning and planning had taken place. When construction is complete in 2023, the campus will include detached rental townhomes, independent and assisted living apartments, memory care apartments, and an array of indoor and outdoor amenities.

Residential Services

- The Lyngblomsten Care Center, Lyngblomsten Apartments, and The Heritage at Lyngblomsten continued to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, following guidance from federal and state health agencies related to visitation, testing, staffing, and more. Updated guidelines issued in the fall allowed for more consistent indoor visitation opportunities for care center residents, with nearly all visitation restrictions lifted by the end of the year.
- From December 2020 through March 2021, Lyngblomsten held COVID-19 vaccine clinics for residents, tenants, essential caregivers, and employees. Booster shot clinics occurred in November, so that by year's end, much of the Lyngblomsten community had received all recommended vaccine doses.
- In August, The Heritage at Lyngblomsten apartments became licensed as an assisted living facility. This change was needed due to a new assisted living law that took effect for the state of Minnesota that month.
- Home Health Services (which provides personal/ home care services for Lyngblomsten housing tenants) modified its program for The Heritage at Lyngblomsten to align with the new assisted living law. Our Home Health team also serves tenants at the Lyngblomsten Apartments under its comprehensive home care license.
- After nearly a decade of planning, Lyngblomsten broke ground in late fall for its new continuumof-care senior living campus in Lino Lakes.
 Around 80 people attended the ceremonial groundbreaking on November 9, including project representatives, city officials, board directors, and future residents. Financing closed for the \$65 million project on October 5, which had received final approval from the Lyngblomsten Board of Directors a week earlier.

Community Services

NOTE: "2nd Half with Lyngblomsten" and "Lyngblomsten Community Services" are used interchangeably.

- 2nd Half with Lyngblomsten continued to offer community programming remotely (i.e., online, over the phone, and via email), including social opportunities, educational presentations, and caregiver services (e.g., one-on-one coaching, Group eRespite).
- After an 18-month hiatus due to the pandemic,
 The Gathering group respite program relaunched
 in October for participants and their caregivers.
 While maintaining its core focus, the program
 underwent modifications that accounted for
 challenges and opportunities identified in a
 sustainability study conducted in 2021.
- Lyngblomsten became a collaborative partner with the Faith Community Nurse Network of the Greater Twin Cities (FCNN). This partnership allows 2nd Half with Lyngblomsten to expand its evidence-based wellness classes to the community, and it helps strengthen Lyngblomsten's support for parish nurses.

Supporters

- Lyngblomsten welcomed volunteers back into its campus buildings in May, having not hosted them inside since the pandemic began. By year's end, 140 individuals had given nearly 3,100 hours of service for the Lyngblomsten community—delivering mail, escorting residents to on-campus appointments, serving with The Gathering, assisting with projects remotely, and more.
- For the second year in a row, the Lyngblomsten
 Foundation held its Spring Gala fundraiser
 virtually due to the pandemic. Broadcast live
 from a studio in Crystal, the hourlong program
 surpassed its fundraising goal of \$70,000 by nearly
 30 percent. Funds raised went to support 2nd
 Half with Lyngblomsten community services.
- The Lyngblomsten Foundation worked on several special projects, including closing out the capital campaign, consulting with the Community Services team to design a strategic sustainability plan for 2nd Half with Lyngblomsten, refreshing planned giving, and exploring an endowment for Community Services.
- At the President's Dinner in October, Sherwin Singsaas was presented with the Anna Quale



Fergstad Award for Distinguished Service in recognition of his generous sharing of time and treasure with Lyngblomsten.

Other

- As pandemic conditions stabilized, Lyngblomsten's Lifelong Learning & the Arts
 Department offered in-person enrichment
 opportunities for housing tenants, while also
 continuing to make available a variety of online
 resources. Program partners for these in-person
 activities included the Northern Clay Center, Art
 with Heart, Ageless Grace, the Cowles Center,
 the Bach Society of Minnesota, and OOPS-MN
 (Opera-Oriented Project Sponsorships).
- Amid ongoing concerns about the pandemic, Lyngblomsten decided not to host the annual Mid-Summer Festival.
- eMenuChoice expanded its customer base by nearly 25 percent—reaching 261 sites across 38 U.S. states—and grew revenue by 40 percent. A number of new product features were developed, which included many improvements to the resident/family member experience when accessing their accounts to place orders and make reservations. As the company was on track to reach break-even in 2022, options around longrange strategies began being discussed.






